

Canceled Debts

Jesus said, "Two men owed money to a certain moneylender. One owed him five hundred denarii, and the other fifty. Neither of them had the money to pay him back, so he canceled the debts of both. Now which of them will love him more?" (Luke 7:41,42)

One day Jesus was invited to dinner at the home of a religious leader named Simon. He was a member of the group called the Pharisees that believed their good works made them worthy before God; they didn't believe that they needed to be saved from their sins.

There was an unexpected guest at the gathering—a sinful woman, a prostitute. She had come to honor Jesus by pouring expensive perfume and even her own tears on his feet.

Simon was upset that Jesus was welcoming the praise of this sinful woman. He thought that if Jesus really knew who she was, he would not even let her touch him. The truth is Jesus knew that she had lived a sinful life. He also knew that her joyful tears were born of his forgiving love for her.

So Jesus told a story to teach Simon and us a lesson about forgiveness. There were two men who were in debt. One of them owed a moneylender about three years' worth of wages. The other owed the same moneylender about 50 days of wages. Neither was able to repay, so the moneylender graciously canceled both debts. Jesus posed a question: "Now which one of them will love him more?" Simon answered correctly that the one who had the larger debt canceled would have loved the moneylender more.

Jesus' short story speaks volumes for our lives. We all have a huge debt that we cannot pay. We cannot make up for all the sinful things we do, not by doing more good things or by doing less bad things. We can't cancel the debt of sin by anything we think, do, or say.

But God saw our desperate need and loves us. He canceled our debt of sin. He did that by having his Son, Jesus, pay it completely for everyone. The price He paid was His death. As the sinless Son of God, He was able to take all of

our sins on Himself and suffer their punishment for us. By His death, He canceled the debt of our sin. Three days after he died, he rose from the dead to prove that His sacrifice counted for all of us.

It's springtime, and Christians are celebrating the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. What a great time of the year to be reminded that Jesus has canceled our debt of sin and given us new life with Himself!

### Parish Nurse Notes

Welcome to April. Hopefully the month will only have rain showers and not snow showers. When I was trying to decide what to write about this month, I came across an article on increasing protein intake in your diet. I thought I really need to do that. The article got me thinking about muscles and muscle strength.

This month I would like to talk about the loss of muscle mass and strength that occurs as a person ages. Muscle mass decreases approximately 3-8% per decade after the age 30. If you are over 60, the rate of decline is even higher. The loss could proceed to a point at which a diagnosis of sarcopenia (saar-ko-peeni-uh) is made. Sarcopenia is defined as the age-related progressive loss of muscle mass and strength. It is estimated that 5-13% of adults over 60 have sarcopenia, but that estimate may be low. Everyone loses muscle mass over time, but people with sarcopenia lose it more quickly.


What can you do to avoid being the person who calls out "Help, I've fallen, and I can't get up"? Exercise is one of the best ways to slow or prevent problems with muscles, joints, and bones. Walking is good exercise but you should include muscle strengthening exercises and resistance training in your routine. You can join an exercise class, or you can do exercises in your home. You know yourself and can decide if you are more likely to follow through with group or home exercises. When exercising at home you can start without weights. After time, you can progress to light weights and then heavier weights. The same is true in class or gym. Weights in your home can be things like a soup can or a half-gallon plastic bottle filled with water. Useful exercises include squats, incline pushups (pushups leaning against a wall, then progress to a countertop, and then something even lower), backward lunge, a seated row (you may need a resistance band for this one), dead bug (I would try to explain it, but I think you need to look it up or ask me at church.) Plan on performing strengthening and resistance exercises three or four times per week.

Eating a healthy diet is important for preventing muscle loss and regaining muscle strength. It's especially important to increase your protein intake. Here are some suggestions:

- Include Greek yogurt in your breakfast menu. You can eat it plain, add sweet or savory toppings, or throw it into a smoothie.
- Eggs are an easy way to get protein on the go. Boil a dozen eggs and have them available for a grab and go snack. Eggs can make a good protein-rich meal.
- 3. Do you drink smoothies? Add a scoop of protein powder and power it up.
- 4. Add some tuna to your salad.
- 5. Sprinkle your salad, yogurt, or oatmeal with nuts or seeds. Or eat one ounce of nuts as a snack.
- 6. Eat lean meat such as ground turkey or a chicken breast.
- 7. Consider plant protein sources. This could be lentils, chickpeas, beans or tofu.
- 8. Higher protein grains could be an option. Farro and quinoa are examples.
- 9. Cheese can be a good snack. Just remember portion size.

If you are over 50, you may need 75 grams of protein per day. Read labels to know how much you are eating.

Remember exercise, eat well, and stay strong.

### How Can Parents Find the Balance Between

### Being Too Restrictive and Too Permissive?

Parenting is a balancing act. Often, we have a hard time seeing clearly that we are too far to one side until after the fact. Many parents, including myself, fall into habits that are based on emotion and may



not realize that we need to adjust our approach until we see behavior or reactions in our children that are undesirable or worrisome.

We may also become so consumed with the busyness of life that we are not always mindful of how parenting decisions we make now might impact the future. It's easy to conclude, "Parenting is difficult! Why don't children come with an instruction manual?"

Thankfully, we do have guidance on how to approach our children—and I'm not referring to the long list of parenting books you can find online. If you read many of those, your head will spin with a wide variety of approaches and opinions. As Christians, we can lean on the Bible for guidance.

#### God's encouragement for parents

I find it interesting, although not surprising, that God gives us what we need to know, and it matches what researchers in psychology and development have found.

- God tells us that raising children is a responsibility to take seriously.
- God tells us that we need to be consistent so as not to confuse our children.
- God tells us that discipline includes being firm (having limits) while also showing love (which doesn't mean we have to give in).
- God tells us that we are role models and need to consider our influence on our children.
- God tells us that parenting includes teaching and encouraging.

The most important advice you will not find in psychology: God tells us to train our children in his Word and follow his commands. Because we all fall short of these things daily, we also have—and can teach our children—forgiveness through Christ's death and resurrection. See how God treats us and teaches us, and you will have all you need to find the right balance.



#### My encouragement for parents

Since parenting requires a balance between being warm and gentle while also providing structure and control, parents need to consider where their own strengths and weaknesses might be. When possible, it is good to rely on your spouse and work together toward this balance as each parent has his or her own strengths that can benefit the children. If you have a soft spot that might cause you to give in often to your children, consider how to firm up.



If you are often firm and rigid in teaching your children right and wrong, consider how to show them emotional support and connection. Children need both in a consistent and predictable manner. Remember, it's important to support each other in parenting as many parents find themselves fighting about how to raise their children.

The trend in parenting today is to let children lead, and many parents believe they are being good parents if their children like them and are pleased with their parenting. When teaching children, you will find it difficult if the goal is to make them happy. Good parents will upset their children frequently (e.g., "Eat your vegetables," "Time for bed").

Understanding that trend, I need the reminder I share with everyone else: It is important that your children learn how to deal with frustration, to struggle or fail sometimes, to be bored and problem solve, and to handle responsibility. We parents need to create an environment where they can learn these things. We need to set limits and follow through, so our children know what to expect, all the while showing them love and support as we guide them through the challenges of life.

#### REPELLING OTHERS IN THE NAME OF CHRIST

#### From April, 2009

Have you ever heard about that one woman people met on a mission trip a while back? She was a pretty well-known psychic in the area. And she was following the Apostle Paul around and yelling to everyone, "Yo, listen up, these guys speak for the real God and they know the way to live forever! Listen up!" And like the pimped-up car with the tinted windows sitting next to me at a light, her "boom, boom, boom" message was constant and loud. It definitely turned head s. And like the cranked sound system starts annoying me after maybe 30 seconds. She annoyed. She kept at it for days on end.

At first glance, she's really into promoting the Lord's apostle and the cause of Christ. She's definitely throwing attention on them. She's vocal and persistent. She's got a sketchy past. But those who watched all this noise at first might see her as motivated by Paul's message. And then something bizarre happens ... the Lord's apostle gets tired of the endless noise. He turns around, commands the evil spirit within her to leave. It does. Jesus always trumps demons.

"This girl followed Paul and the rest of us, shouting, "These men are servants of the Most High God, who are telling you the way to be saved." She kept this up for many days. Finally Paul became so troubled that he turned around and said to the spirit, "In the name of Jesus Christ I command you to come out of her!" At that moment the spirit left her." Acts 16:17-18

The history of Acts 16 really isn't about the girl at all. And it's not really about corrupt people trafficking her to make money off of her. It's not even about these dudes taking the Lord's apostle to court, to make the apostle Paul pay for taking away their business. They knew the Lord's apostle freed her from the psychic spirit, and with that their control over her and their way of making money off of her went away. The question is: Why did the Holy Spirit record this particular history?

Why would an evil spirit tell this psychic-girl to call attention to the Lord's apostle? The whole of Scripture shows us that demons were not in the habit of publicly pestering the Lord's agents especially by telling people to listen to them. Why would a demon tell her to say, "These men are servants of the Most High God, who are telling you the way to be saved."? That doesn't make sense to me ... unless the demons knew she was actually repelling people by her actions. Hell's strategy did not matter. Jesus is compassionate. Jesus had His apostle free her from this psychic demon, from the control of slave-handlers, and from Satan's deceptive ways.

Like you, I'm drawn to think a bit about that girl. For everything that was written in the past was written to teach us, so that through the endurance taught in the Scriptures and the encouragement the Word provides we might have hope. (ROMANS 15:4) Besides the obvious compassionate power Jesus displayed through His apostle, what else does the Holy Spirit teach me? For instance, what can I learn about telling the truth about the Good News of Jesus? This psychic-demon possessed girl was telling the truth about the Lord's apostle and His Gospel. Yet her way had opposite effect of the words she was continually shouting.

The Holy Spirit teaches us Christ-followers to be gentle, humble, filled with respect, love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, self-control. Jesus said we will be seen by others to be His followers when we love others like He loves us. How might this play out in real life today? Here's what "Pastor Scott" shared with me a few years back. He had taken his congregation's youth on a retreat. One of the girls pointed out to her Bible-study break-out group that she wanted more and better: more and better times for more and better Bible study, more and better praying, more and better worship. And her group had better get more and more serious about God just like she was.

Needless to say, she was passionate, but sadly she was repelling. She tried to make her friends do and act like she wanted. It had the opposite effect. Her peers backed away from listening to her as if she was a singing classical music oper a. Others just felt like they didn't make the grade, were not good enough when she was around. She always pointed out

they were always failing at this or that. They were nowhere near to where she thought they should be spiritually.

Later in the retreat, one of the young women found lice in her own hair. Suddenly superspiritual sweetie flipped, got angry, called the girl "disgusting" and refused to be in the same room, not even ride back in the same car. The poor embarrassed victim felt like crawling under a rock and dying. While miss-super-spiritual threw her fit, a different girl in Pastor Scott's group acted in a surprising way. Previously that girl was known for making some poor life choices. But this is the young Christian girl who lathered lice treatment into the infected girl's hair. This is the girl who stayed with her; cried with her; patiently and lovingly combed out dead lice and eggs until the girl was clean. All the while, she quietly calmed the stressed young woman. This is the girl who reminded her that Jesus loved her. The lice - thing was stressful, but was not life-threatening. It could, and did, happen to anyone.

It was very clear who represented Christ well that weekend. When they got back, the very next youth-group meeting, the first super-spiritual girl shared her testimony about all the Bible truth she learned at the retreat. She went on at length about what it means to love and care for others. She stood on the Bible and boasted about how good she was at crushing Satan.

Unfortunately, no one could hear her.

Her previous actions were still ringing in their spiritual ears. Pastor Scott did say that several girls in his group talked with her after her message. But sadly, the super-spiritual girl was not about to take any advice from them. They did not know God like she did. They were lower on the spiritual maturity ladder. Her attitude of sweet arrogance was like a disgusting repellent. Before we go much further, remember we don't know the end of her story, just this little snippet from 2009.

But like Pastor Scott shared, the whole point of the gospel of Jesus Christ at that youth retreat was missed. She was puffing yourself up. Putting others down. She was off-putting as if she was spiritually mature. She had little compassion for others, little empathy with those she deemed less spiritually mature. That left Pastor Scott wondering how could that super-spiritual person have been so blind to think that she was lifting up Christ? The youth would duck and run for cover when the y saw her coming. I may not know my Bible really good yet, but from what I read, Jesus was not Pastor Scott's student.

Jesus listened to strangers, family, friends, enemies. He had genuine compassion as He heard them; called them by name; ate dinner at their houses; invited relationships with them. But pharisees of Jesus' day were all to often like Pastor

Scott's super-spiritual student. Jesus' Pharisees were all about puffing themselves up, putting others down. They would raise their eyebrows at those they deemed less spiritually mature. They would smirk at those less spiritually mature than what they held themselves to be. They would draw attention to how they did the right things for God, the right way. They even smirked and grumbled about Jesus who hung out with the wrong crowd, dressed the wrong way, didn't follow their rules.

Before I start looking down my nose at Pharisees, God's Word reveals a most-disturbing truth: all of us, you and I, have an in-born little pharisee. Our little sin-arrogant nature likes to boast about what we think is good, how others should speak, think, live what we say is the right way to think, speak and live. Jesus warns His disciples to watch out for the pharisee-attitude. I need that Word of warning to put a lid on my own little pharisee who is just itching to take over my life, my thoughts, my words.

The Holy Spirit guards and guides me with His Word. When the pharisees of today's culture are happy with me, it's a little signal that it is probably time for me to re-evaluate my own witness about Jesus. What is my attitude when talking the truth to others? Is it to embarrass others? To show that they don't measure up? they failed again? Or is it to he lp them? to have compassion on them? To bless them with an understanding of God's forgiveness in Jesus Christ? I hate sin not because I am better than others. I hate sin because it dishonors Jesus and hurts those who follow after sin.

Our heavenly Father was not like the Pharisees. He demonstrated His love by sending His Son. The Savior Jesus was not like Pharisees. He demonstrated His merciful kindness to ignorant fools, even to the point of His crucifixion. The Ho ly Spirit was not like the Pharisees. He demonstrates God's Gospel of "sins forgiven for Jesus' sake" everyday in my life, to me... Jesus enables me to reflect His authentic Gospel kindness and not be like the Pharisees.



According to commentary from Rev. Robert Fleischmann, "With access to surgical abortion now restricted in many states, 53% of abortions are now chemical abortions."


