

Search For What Was Lost

Jesus told this parable, "Suppose a woman has ten silver coins and loses one. Doesn't she light a lamp, sweep the house and search carefully until she finds it? And when she finds it, she calls her friends and neighbors together and says, 'Rejoice with me; I have found my lost coin.' In the same way, I tell you, there is rejoicing in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents" (Luke 15:8-10).

My wife works with a lady who buys her lottery tickets every now and then. One day, a rumor spread that our local grocery store sold a \$100,000 ticket. We both thought, "Are we winners?" How would we spend it? Then I said, "Honey, where's the ticket?" After a brief panic and a 20-minute search of the house, we found it. The ticket was a loser.

When we lose something that we hold to be valuable, we search for it frantically. That's what Jesus described in this short story about a woman searching for a coin that she lost. Without Jesus, you and I are like that lost coin.

Our lustful thoughts, hurting words, and loveless deeds—everything we think, say, or do that fails to be perfect—are sins that separate us from God. How frightening to be lost in sin!

Thankfully, though, there is good news! Jesus came "to seek and to save what was lost" (Luke 19:10). God sent Jesus to find us, to reconnect us to God. Jesus did that when He paid for all our sins by his death on the cross. That is God-love in action, that's how much Jesus loves us!

Jesus searches for us and finds us. The angels in heaven rejoice! Jesus comes to us through His Word, takes away our fear, comforts us with the forgiveness of sins. He assures us that He has made us dearly loved children of God. Through Jesus, heaven is our inheritance.

God loves us so much that He stopped at nothing to find us and save us from eternal separation from Him in hell. Through Jesus, we have the gift of eternal life, which is a whole lot more valuable than winning the lottery. How fortunate we are! We will never be lost again when we cling in faith to Jesus, our Savior.

Come and share with us the love of Jesus. Like heaven's angels, we rejoice over all Jesus did to find us and give us life with God.

New Things Are Hard!

We are off to a great start of the year, but teachers and students alike are getting used to new things. Here are some tips to help your child if they are having trouble adjusting to a new school or other difficult things (from September 2024 Forward in Christ article by Whitney Donovan):

Listen to your child and acknowledge that the feelings are valid. Navigating change can feel overwhelming, even for adults! Empathizing with your child and providing a safe space for sharing worries and fears can be a huge help in moving beyond those fears...Coping skills for those situations to teach could be: going for a walk, listening to music, taking deep breaths, or saying a prayer. You can brainstorm with your child to discover coping skills that are appropriate for your child's stress. Offer your child examples that work for you.

Establish the new routine. Kids thrive with structure and predictability. Creating routines can help decrease some of the nerves around school. A morning routine is what happens from wake-up until arrival at school. Try to keep it consistent from day to day. Talk with your child ahead of time if there is going to be a change in the routine. For young kids, a picture schedule can help them understand the plan more clearly.

A final thought from your Good Shepherd teachers: remind your child that they are loved by Jesus no matter what and communicate with us about any struggles so we can support you!

Parish Nurse Notes

It is October. It is fall and you might be seeing colors like orange, red, yellow, brown. But during the month of October, you might be seeing a lot of pink. October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Aside from skin cancer, breast cancer is the most common cancer that affects females and represents 14% of all new cancer diagnoses in the United States. This month I would like to focus on the American Cancer Society's recommendation for breast cancer screening.

Screening tests are used to find diseases in people who have no symptoms. Breast cancers found during screening exams are more likely to be smaller and less likely to have spread outside the breast. That means a better prognosis. Guidelines are available for the average risk women and the high-risk women.

<u>Who is considered average risk?</u> The woman who doesn't have a personal history of breast cancer, a strong family history of breast cancer, or a genetic mutation known to increase risk of breast cancer (such as in a *BRCA* gene) and has not had chest radiation therapy before the age of 30.

Who is considered high risk? A woman with a *BRCA1* or *BRCA2* gene mutation or has a first-degree relative (parent, brother, sister, or child) with the mutation. A woman is considered high risk if she has Li-Fraumeni syndrome, Cowden syndrome, or Bannayan-Riley-Ruvalcaba syndrome, or have first-degree relatives with one of these syndromes, if she had radiation therapy to the chest before the age of 30, or if she has a lifetime risk of breast cancer of about 20% to 25% or greater, according to risk assessment tools.

These are the American Cancer Society's guidelines for **average risk women**:

Women between 40 and 44 have the option to start screening with a mammogram every year.



- Women 45 to 54 should get mammograms every year.
- Women 55 and older can switch to a mammogram every other year, or they can choose to continue yearly mammograms. Screening should continue as long as a woman is in good health and is expected to live at least 10 more years.

What is a mammogram and what are the different types? A mammogram is an xray picture of the breast. It is 85% to 90% accurate. In the United States digital mammography has replaced conventional film mammography. Either 2D or 3D digital mammography is used. Both conventional film and digital mammography use x-ray but the way the image is saved is different. Digital mammography allows healthcare providers to save the file electronically and to more easily evaluate and share the images.

A 2D mammogram usually involves two pictures of each breast taken at different angles — typically from top to bottom and from side to side — and provides a two -dimensional (2D) view. The breast is compressed for each view taken.

3D mammography is a newer type of mammogram in which each breast is compressed once, and a machine takes several low-dose X-rays as it moves in an arc over the breast taking many more images of the breast. A computer assembles these images into cross-sections, or slices, of breast tissue. allowing healthcare providers to see breast tissues more clearly in three dimensions. Many studies have revealed that 3D mammography increases cancer detection, including lower-grade cancers, and decreases false-positive rates. Given these advantages, 3D mammography for both screening and diagnostic mammograms is rapidly becoming the go-to option for mammograms. It should be noted that 3D mammograms often cost more than 2D mammograms, and this added cost may not be covered by insurance.

Research has not shown a clear benefit of regular physical breast exams done by either a health professional (clinical breast exams) or by women themselves (breast self-exams). There is very little evidence that these tests help find breast cancer early when women also get screening mammograms. Women who do find a lump typically find it during daily activities such as bathing. Clinical breast exams are not recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening among average-risk women at any age.

Women who are at **high risk** for breast cancer based on certain factors should get a breast MRI (magnetic resonance imaging) and a mammogram every year, typically starting at age 30. A breast MRI uses radio waves and strong magnets to make detailed pictures of the inside of the breast. If breast MRI is used, it should be in addition to, not instead of, a screening mammogram. This is because although an MRI is more likely to find cancer than a mammogram, it may still miss some cancers that a mammogram would find. A breast MRI is not recommended for an average risk women because the test is more likely to find things that turn out not to be cancer (called a *false positive*).

Careful breast exams might be useful for screening men with a strong family history of breast cancer and/or with *BRCA* mutations found by genetic testing. Screening men for breast cancer has not been studied to conclude if it is helpful, and mammography and ultrasound is usually only done if a lump is found.

Enjoy the traditional fall colors. But when you see pink remember the importance of breast cancer screening.



The church-year calendar divides into two parts. The **first half** reviews the earthly life of Jesus Christ. The **second half** reviews Jesus Christ's teachings as we, His followers, put them into practice in our lives.

FIRST HALF OF THE CHURCH YEAR - THE LIFE OF CHRIST



CHRISTMAS (twelve full days celebrating the birth of Christ)

EPIPHANY January 6; the revealing of the Savior to the non-Jews)

BAPTISM of Jesus (first Sunday after Epiphany)

TRANSFIGURATION (last Sunday after Epiphany)

THE EASTER CYLCE OR THE TIME OF EASTER LENT (beginning on Ash Wednesday; a time of 40 days, not counting the five Sundays; preparation for crucifixion

MAUNDY THURSDAY, GOOD FRIDAY, Holy Saturday (The final three days of Holy Week are called the Tridium "three days")

EASTER SEASON (including **Easter** Sunday - **Resurrection Da**y of Jesus Christ from the dead)

Ascension (Easter +40th day)

PENTECOST (Easter + 50th day; celebration of the coming of the Holy Spirit)

The word "Liturgy" means "people's work". It is designed to be *for* people not against them. It is one of many ways to structure how pastors and people learn and review all of God's mercies He has revealed in His Word. Many folks grumble about liturgy, their likes and dislikes. Even many pastors and church leaders boast that they are anti-liturgical. So let's remember: *"Worship!"* is God's clear command, but a particular pattern or style of worship is not commanded.

WHY EVEN USE A LIYURGY FOR WORSHIP?

1.HISTORIC ROOTS. The race of faith is a relay race, one generation handing on the truth faithfully to the next generation. Some portions of our liturgy connect us to believers at worship in the days of Moses, or those who were listening to the apostles give their sermons.

2. A DISTINGUISHING MARK? What we believe (God's Word) determines how we worship (God's Word) and how we confess what we believe (God's Word).

3. REPETIION? It is the mother of learning. BUT Just eating steak & eggs all the time, every meal, is not healthy (especially for infants). And Dad is also right: one desert after another (think trick-or-treat) is not healthy. So also, in worship. Endless variety just for variety's sake is not healthy. And mindless repetition for habit's sake is not healthy.

4.COMMUNITY? Public Worship is a shared activity. God instructs, "Let us go to the house of the Lord." (Psalm 122) The Holy Spirit gathers His family for four reasons:

1) Psalm 115:1 To give God the glory

2) 1 Peter 4:10; Philippians 1:25 To serve one another's faith.

3) Colossians 2:2 to be encouraged with strong ties of God-love;

4) Hebrews 10:25; 1 Thessalonians 5:11 to meet together in God's presence, at His bidding and blessing, before the great Day comes

5 STAND FIRM IN THE FACE OF THE HERE AND NOW When the Roman world was going to hell in a hand basket, the church was debating the two natures of Christ, not Roman politics. In worship, **God's Word sets life's agenda**. God's Word defines sin and announces God's divine solution. The Liturgy is a great tool that proclaims and promotes Truth, not fads or fears or "woke" ideas of life.

6 NAVIGATE FROM CHILDHOOD TO ADULTHOOD. Feelings come and go. The liturgy supplies an anchor in Jesus Christ for the feelings of life. This is repeated through Water and the Word, Communion, sermons and songs in public worship. God's Family-of-Faith is all about WHOM it is we worship and WHY God gathers us to worship. It's *not* about you and me, it's about Him who saved us.

7 The Word of God. *Faith comes from hearing the message of the Word of Christ* (Romans 10:17). Liturgy is a well-traveled road in life on which we hear Christ's message. For I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God (1 Corinthians 1:18) for salvation to everyone who believes (Romans 1:16)

Jesus said "ANYONE WHO BELONGS TO GOD LISTENS GLADLY TO THE WORDS OF GOD. BUT YOU DON'T LISTEN BECAUSE YOU DON'T BELONG TO GOD." (John 8:47)

When Jesus calls His people to worship, the effect of His Word can be seen by anyone who has their eyes open. You can hear it as we encourage others and praise God. What a privilege to gladly hear and learn God's Word. As has been said, AMOR TUSSISQUE NON CELANTUR. - "Love, and a cough, are not concealed ".


WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY-RUTH
